AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE
public peace and to prevent riots and
disturbances and disorderly assemblages.

Passed May 16, 1899.

The Village of Camden Ordains:

Section 1. Any person who shall create, make, aid, countenance or assist in making any riot, disturbance, unnecessary or unusual noise, disorderly and unlawful assemblage or improper diversion, or who shall be

guilty of any indecent, immoral or insulting conduct, language or behavior in the streets or elsewhere in the village of Camden; and all persons who shall collect in bodies or crowds in said village for unlawful purposes, to the annoyance or disturbance of the citizens or travelers, shall for each offense, on conviction before a competent court, be subject to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars and imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, or either, at the discretion of the court, and may also be held to bail for good behavior for such time, not exceeding one year, as may be deemed proper by the court.

Section 2. Any person who may be found lurking, lying in wait, or concealed in any house or other building, or in any yard or other premises within the limits of the village with intent to do any mischief, or to pilfer or commit any crime or misdemeanor whatever shall for each such offense, on conviction before a competent court, be subject to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars and imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, or either, at the discretion of the court, and may also be held to bail for good behavior.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect June 1, 1899.
