

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE
riding of bicycles and tricycles and similar
vehicles within the corporate limits of the
village of Camden.**

Passed May 19, 1899.

The village of Camden ordains:

Section 1. No person shall ride a bicycle or tricycle or other similar vehicle upon or along any public street, alley, or way within the corporate limits of the village of Camden, at speed exceeding eight miles an hour, and upon crossing intersections of streets no person shall ride such vehicle at a speed exceeding six miles an hour.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of all persons riding such machines or vehicles to be provided with a suitable bell, which shall be attached to the handles of their vehicles, and it shall be their further duty to ring such bells upon approaching persons or vehicles upon the street; such signal to be given at a distance of not less than fifty feet from such person or vehicle; and it shall also be their duty to ring such bell on approaching every street crossing.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of all persons riding as aforesaid to pass to the right of all persons or vehicles whom they meet, and when about to overtake a vehicle or pedestrian it shall be their duty to ring their bells at a distance of not less than fifty feet from such vehicle or pedestrian and then pass them on the left.

Section 4. No person shall ride a bicycle, tricycle, or other similar vehicle upon or along any sidewalk or footpath within the corporate limits of the village of Camden aforesaid.

Section 5. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine, not exceeding ten dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding twenty days, or by both such fine or imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect June 7, 1899. H. H. Houtz, clerk.
